

After that night, Cynthia began to walk in slow circles outside the family home looking for traces of her sister Mallory - she's sure that she must be somewhere else now, wherever that is. Cynthia knows that she doesn't belong here. Her mother never belonged here either. This is the place of violence. Despair. The long dry. Blood caked under the nails. Desperate men. Long silences. The place where mothers go mad in locked bedrooms, where women like Cynthia imagine better futures.

In Northern New South Wales, heavily pregnant and a week away from maternity leave, Detective Sergeant Kate Miles is exhausted and counting down the days. But a violent hold-up at a local fast-food restaurant with unsettling connections to her own past, means that her final days will be anything but straightforward. When a second case is dumped on her lap, the closed case of man drowned in recent summer floods, what begins as a simple informal review quickly grows into something more complicated. Kate can either write the report that's expected of her or investigate the case the way she wants to.


Wild Dogs by Michael Trant

And during the mysterious eleven days that Agatha goes missing, they will unravel a dark secret that only Nan holds the key to . . .






The God of That Summer by Ralf Rothmann




Again, Rachel by Marian Keyes




Should I Tell You? by Jill Mansell




Quicksilver by Dean Koontz


The Dreaming Path by Dr Paul Callaghan




Home in the World by Amartya Sen






George III by Andrew Roberts


Jann is reading All My Mothers by Joanna Glen




Shana is reading Saltwater in the Blood by Easkey Britton


Wendy is reading The Essential New York Times Cookbook by Amanda Hesser
