


Dead Man's Grave by Neil Lancaster


Remember My Name by Sam Blake




The Natural History of Love by Caroline Petit


In Deep Water by Christobel Kent

They think I'm working hard to impress them.


They think I'm here to save an innocent man on death row.




Bad Actors by Mick Herron








Lisa: A Memoir - 60 Years of Life, Love and Loss by Lisa Curry

William Stoner enters the University of Missouri at nineteen to study agriculture. A seminar on English literature changes his life, and he never returns to work on his father's farm. Stoner becomes a teacher. He marries the wrong woman. His life is quiet, and after his death, his colleagues remember him rarely. Yet with truthfulness, compassion and intense power, this novel uncovers a story of universal value - of the conflicts, defeats and victories of the human race that pass unrecorded by history - and in doing so reclaims the significance of an individual life.

Wole Soyinka Chronicles From the Land of the Happiest People On Earth

Amanda is reading Chronicles From the Land of the Happiest People on Earth by Wole Soyinka




Jo is reading Phosphorescence by Julia Baird

Marina is reading The Hour of the Witch by Chris Bohjalian

A young Puritan woman—faithful, resourceful, but afraid of the demons that dog her soul—plots her escape from a violent marriage in this riveting and propulsive novel of historical suspense. Boston, 1662. Mary Deerfield is twenty-four-years-old. Her skin is porcelain, her eyes delft blue, and in England she might have had many suitors. But here in the New World, amid this community of saints, Mary is the second wife of Thomas Deerfield, a man as cruel as he is powerful. When Thomas, prone to drunken rage, drives a three-tined fork into the back of Mary's hand, she resolves that she must divorce him to save her life.



Claire is reading The Metal Heart by Caroline Lea

Orkney, 1940. On a remote island, a prisoner-of-war camp is constructed to house five hundred Italian soldiers, where a freezing winter and divided community await them. Orphaned sisters Dorothy and Constance volunteer to nurse the men. Dot is drawn to Cesare, a young man fighting on the wrong side, broken by war and destruction. The soldiers spend their days building a secret barricade between the islands. By night, however, they construct a reminder of their native land - an exquisite chapel.




Ingrid is reading Do Something for Nothing by Joshua Coombes




Jessie is reading Before You Knew My Name by Jacqueline Bublitz
